MAYOR'S MESSAGE

The last 12 months have been some of the busiest and most productive in our City's history as Council continued to invest in high quality facilities and services for the community.

Despite the challenges of COVID-19 over the past 18 months, Council remains in a strong financial position moving into the new financial year. This allows us to continue to deliver important services and exciting new projects to strengthen our City as a great place to live, work, play and raise a family.

Prudent financial management in previous years ensures money is available for future investment in our City while keeping our rates and borrowings among the lowest in Sydney. The 2021/22 Operational Plan lists all of Council's projects and expenditure planned for the coming financial year. We are investing \$60m in infrastructure this year, some of the projects include an indoor multicultural and sporting centre at Fairfield Showground; an upgrade to Cabravale Leisure Centre to provide services to people with disabilities, the elderly and those recovering from illness; significant upgrades to Endeavour Park, Bareena Park and Fairfield Heights Park, and finalising construction of the wave pool at Aquatopia.

Council will also continue its program of improvements to sporting facilities, footpaths, roads and play equipment throughout our City. These projects are important to support the health and wellbeing of all residents, and enable them to safely travel around our City.

This is just a snapshot of the exciting things we are delivering for our City. We are doing all this and a lot more while keeping our rates among the lowest in Sydney and maintaining our strong financial position. It continues the strong program of works and services we have delivered to transform this City over the past five years.

We are also strongly advocating on your behalf to the state and federal governments, including asking residents to sign a petition to upgrade Fairfield Hospital, and on matters such as the safety of The Horsley Drive, and the State Government's re-zoning of Horsley Park. 
Financial health check


Comparable rates and charges based on land value of \$600,000 and a standard 240 litre bin for domestic waste.

SERVICES AND PROJECTS UPDATE

Highlights of the services and projects Council delivered in the 2017/18 - 2020/21 period



Fairfield City Centre's \$1.8m Crescent Plaza project provides a hub for residents, shoppers and commuters to come together in a modern space to interact, watch the screen or have lunch in a new, shaded setting.



Aquatopia Water Park

Approximately 350,000 people from across Sydney have visited Aquatopia Water Park since it opened. The attractions have steadily grown to include thrill slides, a water tower and toddler pool, the Wave Rider and Fish Pipe. Work is underway to open a wave pool in time for spring 2021.



Koonoona Park

The 3,200 sqm park opened in 2020 and features a ground level ropes swing set with a boat seat, flying fox, toddler play items, permanent outdoor table tennis table, half basketball court, outdoor exercise equipment, bathroom, shelters with picnic seating and a circuit path.



Fairfield Park Obstacle Course

The Fairfield Park Obstacle Course adds to the variety of active spaces in our City. The 7,500 sqm boot-camp style course has more than a dozen elements designed to challenge fitness, strength, balance and concentration.

Smithfield Road

Smithfield Road was widened from Elizabeth Drive to Polding Street to improve traffic flow and safety along one of our City's busiest roads.

Works included road realignment, new traffic signals and an additional turning lane at Elizabeth Drive.



Fairfield Showground

The transformation of Fairfield Showground involved turning an underused trotting track into the cultural and sporting hub of our City.

The complete redevelopment includes a festival/cricket/AFL arena, synthetic and turf football pitches, amenities building, all-abilities playground, dog park, a 1000-seat pavilion and walking/cycling tracks.



Fairfield Library and Business Hub

The \$6m state of the art Fairfield Library at 1-3 Hamilton Road opened to the public in 2021, almost double the size of the previous library. Meanwhile the old site was redeveloped into the Fairfield City HQ, a business hub for the community.



Dutton Plaza Car Park

The new 219-space car park at the corner of Hughes Street and Dutton Lane brings the total number of much needed parking spaces in the Dutton Plaza precinct to 991. The car park also features rainwater harvesting, solar energy collection and electric car charging bays.

SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Three key attractions of the Fairfield Showground redevelopment masterplan were unveiled to the public last month. The much-anticipated Deerbush Park, People's Globe, and off-leash dog park are the latest in an exciting line up of projects as part of the continuing improvements to Fairfield Showground. Deerbush Park has something for everyone to enjoy, no matter their ability. The park is a first of its kind for Fairfield City, and includes accessible play equipment and facilities for wheelchair users and their carers; a water play space operating in warmer months; walking, rolling and cycling tracks; and picnic areas.

The People's Globe is a new landmark at the Showground's Smithfield Road entrance paying tribute to our City's rich cultural diversity and heritage. The 1.6m diameter granite sphere is engraved with the world map and levitates above a fountain of flowing water, able to be rotated by visitors. A wall of ceramic tiles and bronze plaques close-by represent where people have come from to make Fairfield City their home.

The Showground's off-leash dog park is the biggest in our City catering for dogs of all sizes to exercise safely with their owners or clubs. Doublegated entries will ensure dogs are secure while others enter and exit the park; while seating, shelters and drinking stations have been included for the comfort of dogs and their owners.

| Wave pool, | Aquatopia

Our City's 55 metre wave pool is on track to open in time for Aquatopia's season opening in September, bringing an exciting taste of the beach to Fairfield City.

The wave machine has been installed and the pool will be filled this month for testing in August. Work has also begun on installing more cabanas, palm trees and umbrellas – recreating the beach environment. There will also be a covered stage area for outdoor events – including moonlight cinemas, as well as more bathrooms.

When completed, the \$12 million wave pool will feature surfable breaking waves, allowing locals to learn to surf as well as providing a fun and safe beach experience for families, without the need to travel long distances.

The wavepool is funded by Fairfield City Council and the Federal and State governments through the Western Sydney City Deal Liveability Fund.

| Park upgrades | in planning

Council has begun planning to invest \$4.75 million to construct additional play embellishments and fitness equipment in **Bareena Park**, Canley Vale and **Fairfield Heights Park**, Fairfield Heights.

Council was successful in receiving the funding from the NSW Government's Public Spaces Legacy Program for the parks. The new parks will add to Council's recent investments in super parks such as Deerbush Park, Koonoona Park and Fairfield Adventure Park, so that families have the opportunity to get out and about and be healthy.

The playgrounds and fitness equipment at each park would include something for everyone with features such as toddler play equipment, custom picnic shelters, cycle paths, climbing frames, all abilities play equipment, scooter tracks, natural play areas and park green spaces

The works are expected to be completed in 2022.

Fairfield City HQ

Business start-ups, entrepreneurs, small business enterprises and remote workers can book affordable office space at times that suit them with Council opening Fairfield City HQ, a \$2.8 million community and business hub, in the heart of the Fairfield central business district in July 2021.

The hub demonstrates Council's commitment in supporting local businesses by providing modern high speed internet connection, hot desks, meeting rooms, audio and video recording suites, and kitchen facilities at an affordable price. This especially helps those starting or near the start of their business journey, which can be a difficult time.

Fairfield City HQ will also support businesses through providing training, programs, workshops and facilitating partnerships to promote economic growth and employment opportunities for residents.

There is also a separate meeting room available for community groups to use.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Endeavour Sports Park

Council has begun planning on upgrading the popular and well used Endeavour Sports Park in Fairfield West to make it a high level grass roots sports precinct.

In addition to upgrading the grassed playing areas and netball courts, Council is considering investment in features such as a synthetic football pitch, multi-purpose sport courts, upgrade of the amenities building and clubhouse and improved lighting. The improvements could also include upgrades to the car park, outdoor gym equipment and bicycle and walking paths.



Fairfield Showground Pavilion

Work is well underway on the new \$10 million pavilion at Council's redeveloped Fairfield Showground.

The 1,000 seat pavilion is being built next to the Parklands grandstand and will overlook the newly created elite turf playing field. It will include tiered seating, athlete change rooms and amenities, kitchen and canteen facilities, ticket booth and community spaces.

The shell of the new pavilion has now been completed, and work on the roof and internal fit-out has begun.

The pavilion is being built thanks to a \$7 million grant from the NSW Government and a \$3 million investment from Fairfield City Council.

Work is due for completion by the end of 2021.

ROAD UPGRADES - \$13.7 million

ROADS PROGRAM 20km


This includes repairs to roads and resurfacing. Some areas to benefit this year include Bossley Park, Cabramatta, Edensor Park, Fairfield, Fairfield Heights, Fairfield West, Mt Pritchard, Smithfield and Wetherill Park.


NEW AND UPGRADED FOOTPATHS, UPGRADED KERBS AND GUTTERS - \$7.9 million

FOOTPATH PROGRAM 16.2km KERB AND GUTTER PROGRAM 11km

This includes new footpath links and upgrades to existing cycleways, walkways, pathways, kerbs and gutters.

Some of the areas to benefit this year include Bonnyrigg, Bossley Park, Cabramatta, Fairfield, St Johns Park and Wetherill Park.





PUBLIC BUILDING UPGRADES - \$6.5 million

This program includes renewal and upgrades to car parks, community buildings, public toilets, childcare centres, Fairfield Showground, golf course, leisure centres, libraries, sportsground and park amenity buildings.

PLAYGROUNDS AND SPORTSFIELDS UPGRADES - \$2.5 million

This includes renewal and upgrades of play equipment, seating, signage, lighting, irrigation, sport court and equipment renewal.
