BACKGROUND

Fairfield City Council (Council) prepared and implemented the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy to identify how Council will engage its community to establish if their vision, goals, priorities and aspirations for the future of Fairfield City have changed. The results will inform the

new 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan. As part of the development of the revised Fairfield City Plan, Council undertook extensive community engagement from December 2019 to February 2020 across Fairfield City.



The Fairfield City Plan is a key component of the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework (IPR) which was designed to improve Council's long-term community, financial and asset planning. The IPR Framework ensures Councils plan for a sustainable future for their communities by addressing their needs and priorities as they identify them.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide a summary of the information and data that was gathered through the community engagement process. It should be noted that the findings of this engagement report were the basis of the next 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan.

The Report summarises and analyses information received from 2,157 total surveys, including:

- 2,105 completed surveys from residents living in Fairfield City
- 16 Meetings held with 225 stakeholders working within Fairfield City
- 52 completed surveys were from local businesses in Fairfield City

ENGAGEMENT AIM

The engagement conducted aimed to meet the goals outlined in the 2016-2026 Fairfield City Plan and the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy:

- 2016-2026 Fairfield City Plan -Theme 5 Good Governance and Leadership, Goal 2: A well engaged and informed community
 - Information is available and clearly communicated to the diverse community
 - Our community is connected and engaged innovatively
- 2020 Community Engagement Strategy -Strategic Direction
 - A well engaged and informed community
 - Decision making processes are open and transparent
 - Bolster staff and organisational capacity
 - Building on what we've learned

REPORT OBJECTIVES

The objective of the report is to deliver the following outcomes:

- Develop a detailed report on the needs and priorities of the community based on engagement undertaken, for the development of the 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan.
- Measure the effectiveness of implementing the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy.

METHODOLOGY

Council delivered multiple engagement activities as part of the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy. This was necessary to increase the likelihood of gaining a more representative response from the community.

Council used the fundamentals of community engagement (see Figure 1), which include the IAP2 Public Participation Spectrum and Fairfield City Council's Principles of Engagement which are based on the social justice principles of access, equity, participation and rights, as well as the Community Participation Principles as outlined in the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*.

Engagement with the community included online and paper-based surveys, one-on-one phone surveys, group sessions, advisory committee discussions, interagency networks, workshops, and submissions via email or post.

INVOLVE

To work directly with the public throughout the process to ensure that public and private concerns are consistently understood and considered.

COLLABORATE

To partner with the public in each aspect of the decision including the development of alternatives and the identification of preferred solutions.

EMPOWER

To place decision-making in the hands of the public.

PRINCIPLE 3

All community engagement will be inclusive and accessible to all groups across the City incorporating cultural backgrounds, ages, abilities and genders by considering the need for translations and plain English.

PRINCIPLE 4

A range of engagement tools will be used to ensure opportunities are available for different audiences who may prefer different approaches, such as face-to-face meetings, printed materials, online information or other appropriate channels.

PRINCIPLE 8

Stakeholder privacy and confidentiality in relation to personal information must be respected throughout the engagement process.




Figure 2: Engagement Techniques

DEVELOPMENT OF SURVEY AND ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITY

The survey was designed to meet the Integrated Planning and Reporting objectives for the Fairfield City Plan revision. This was achieved by developing six simple questions that would address three key components for the community:

- Where are we now?
- Where do we want to be in 10 years' time?
- How will we get there?

When addressing 'Where do we want to be in 10 years' time?' the question was presented as multiple choice with an option to select 'Other'. Participants were required to select the top 5 priorities they had over the next 10 years.

Multiple choice questions are a way of simplifying a survey to increase participation for a culturally rich diverse community like Fairfield City. Council identified 47 potential priorities that the community may be interested in and presented them as options for the community to select.

The survey was written in a simple, clear and concise style to ensure it was easily understood by the community. The survey was tested as a pilot through the telephone survey and by Council staff, which resulted in several changes to improve its readability.

Paper-based Survey

The paper-based survey was made available at 10 key locations across Fairfield City and on Council's website. The paper-based survey was translated into languages that are widely spoken in Fairfield city including Arabic, Chinese (Simplified), Khmer, Mandarin, Vietnamese. Council informed community about the survey on Council's websites and social media, through Council's on hold messages and via emails to key stakeholders. A number of surveys

were completed by Council facilitators at events including Australia Day Celebrations, Lunar New Year Canley Heights, Wellness Day for Seniors, Coffee with a Cop, and on site at local shopping centres.

The survey was a short, two-page questionnaire with four multiple choice questions, and five open based questions. Copies of the surveys are included in the Appendix, Figures 45-50.

Online Survey

The online survey was presented via Survey Money and a copy of this is included in the Appendix, Figure 55.

Telephone Survey

Fairfield City Council contracted an external research company as part of the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy. 600 residents were randomly selected to participate in a telephone survey with the results being used to revise the priorities, goals and outcomes identified in the 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan.

Conversation Workshops

More than 277 members of community groups and services providers in Fairfield City were consulted across 16 committee and interagency meetings where they were asked to openly discuss their responses to 5 simple questions. A facilitator oversaw the sessions and assisted the participants to clearly detail their wants and needs for Fairfield City. The stakeholders who attended these conversation aroup sessions were also encouraged to promote the survey and engage with hard to reach community groups.

ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

A Fairfield City Plan Engagement Plan was developed as part of the 2020 Community Engagement Strategy. A list of techniques and activities to engage with the community and identify their needs and priorities was developed to ensure

maximum reach of the surveys so all members of the community had an opportunity to have their say. Figures 3 to 7 below outlines a summary of activities undertaken.

DATA COLLECTION

The survey data was collected through a number of methods including paper and electronic formats between 1 December 2019 and 29 February 2020. The data was then extracted from these methods and combined into a single database for Council staff to analyse findings.

ELECTRONIC: The survey was designed using Survey Monkey, an online survey web platform enabling Council to design, manage, deploy and report results. This also allowed council staff the opportunity to add to the survey database when engaging with the community at events and shopping centres through iPads and other mobile devices if required. Electronic responses made up 28% of the data collected.

PAPER: It was acknowledged that access to the internet is limited across Fairfield City. Overall 17.9% of households have no internet connection or have a dial up connection, and only 75.2% of households

had broadband connectivity, compared with 11.2% and 81.4% respectively for the Greater Sydney Statistical Division. Data from all completed paper based surveys were entered into Survey Monkey. Paper surveys made up 29% of the data collected.

TELPHONE SURVEY: The contractors that undertook the survey, telephone interviewed 600 residents. The interviewees where called at random from an electronic listing. The data was collected and entered in an electronic survey tool, which was then post weighted (by age, gender and location) using the most recent statistics from the Australian Bureau of Statistics. Telephone surveys made up 28% of the data collected.

FORUM: Open discussions were held at committee and interagency meetings where responses were provided verbally and captured by a facilitator. These responses were then incorporated with the Survey Monkey data. Forum discussions made up 13% of the data collected.

FINDINGS

Demographic of Participants

The population of Fairfield City is estimated at 210,825 as of 2020 (according to Profile.id) and there are 27 suburbs making up Fairfield City which are Abbotsbury, Bonnyrigg, Bonnyrigg Heights, Bossley Park, Cabramatta, Cabramatta West, Canley Heights, Canley Vale, Carramar, Cecil Park, Edensor Park, Fairfield, Fairfield East, Fairfield Heights, Fairfield West, Greenfield Park, Horsley Park, Lansvale, Mount Pritchard, Old Guildford, Prairiewood, Smithfield, St Johns Park, Villawood, Wakeley, Wetherill Park and Yennora.

Overall, 53.9% of the population was born overseas, compared with 27.6% for New South Wales. Fairfield is one of the most culturally diverse areas in Australia with the highest number and proportion of people speaking languages other than English (70.7%) at home with 30.4% of those speaking English not well or not at all. Fairfield City has more residents who speak English poorly or not at all than any other Australian city. A total of 2,157 Resident and Business Surveys were completed by residents and businesses in Fairfield City.

Land Use

While the use land use is mainly residential, Fairfield City contains six (6) industrial and business lands (829.8 hectares) which include large-scale industrial estates at Wetherill Park and Smithfield, as well as local industrial centres through the City. The City encompasses a total land area of approximately 104 square kilometres.




Figure 8: Land Usage in Fairfield City (Source: Profile.ID)




Figure 9: Age of Survey Participants

Figure 10 shows that overall the survey results reflected the current population of Fairfield City.

When asked 'how old are you?' the majority of surveyed participants (59%) were aged between 25-59, followed by (27%) seniors, and (15%) being children and youth. There was a slight over representation in adults (35-49 years) and under representation in children (12 or under). See Figure 10 below.





Figure 11: Suburbs Where Survey Participants Reside

The respondents were asked to specify which suburb they lived in within Fairfield City which is shown below in Figure 11.

Figure 12: Suburb versus Population of Fairfield City below shows that generally respondents reflected the recorded population for each area and that the survey reflects the broad Fairfield City community. There was a slight over representation in Fairfield (5%) and Wetherill Park (2%), and under representation in some areas, such as Cabramatta (-2%), Bonnyrigg Heights (-2%), and Mt Pritchard (-3%). COMMUNITY'S VISION

Based on the community's top 10 priorities, the vision for Fairfield City has changed from: "We are Fairfield City – a welcoming, safe and diverse community where we are proud to belong, invest and prosper" to "Fairfield is a vibrant, safe, connected and inclusive City that celebrates and embraces our diversity".

"What do you like about living in Fairfield City?"

The surveyed participants were asked 'what are the three (3) best things about living in Fairfield City?'

The top three responses identified were:



 Multicultural - i.e. a range of cultures/people: this option has risen to the top of the responses by the community in comparison to 2016. This may be due to the success of events such as the Moon Festival, Lunar New Year, and Living Cultures Festival.



2. Variety of food options/restaurants in the area: this option is one of the biggest jumps in comparison to 2016. This may be due to events such as Culinary Carnival, highlighting the variety of food options in Fairfield City, as well as the increase in restaurants in Cabramatta and Canley Heights.



3. Parks, playgrounds and green spaces: this option continues to be in the top five of the best things about living in Fairfield City. Council continues to introduce new parks with playgrounds, as well as new offleash dog parks.

The top 15 popular responses are listed in Figure 15 below and includes the change in ranking compared to 2016.

The majority of survey participants identified diverse multicultural community as one of the best things about living in Fairfield City, which is an increase from the last engagement survey.

Fairfield City Stakeholders continued to deliver on these needs and aspirations, with a majority of surveyed participants expressing that Fairfield City has a friendly community, with access to open green spaces, and the residents feel connected with people and family. Survey participants also commented on the variety of food options and this was a unique and treasured aspect of living in the Fairfield City community.




The surveyed participants were asked 'what are the three (3) things that you would like to change about living in Fairfield City?'

3. Improved parks/playgrounds: this option is one of the highest jumps in comparison to 2016 and is also in the top three for the best things about living in Fairfield City. Though Council continues to upgrade existing parks with gym and play equipment, families are keen for continued upgrades to parks across the City.

The majority of survey participants identified parking not only in Town Centres, but in residential areas, as an important improvement required for the future (411). They continued to identify Cleaner Streets and Reduced Littering (248) and Improved traffic flow and Road Safety (206). Some of these changes noted by the community have been reflected in the Top Priorities for contributing stakeholders to focus on in the new 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan.

The following are some of the direct comments that were made in relation to what residents would change about living in Fairfield City:

"Better access to public transport"

"Better communication of community services, especially to isolated and recent immigrants." "Better phone reception and internet access"

"Car parking. Too much traffic in the streets. Would be good to have more car parking around periphery of the shopping areas, and improve public transport."

"Council support and encouragement for continual late night markets and food truck vendors in major areas like Cabramatta. This would provide much needed recreation after work, boost the local economy and create a bustling sense of community which will attract investors and tourism to our community."

"Greater sustainability of environment"

"more to celebrate Aboriginal culture" "Longer opening hours for some shops, especially restaurants"

"More opportunities for young artists to display their art works and programs that would nurture their creativity."

"Stop sub-dividing lands/ granny flats its leading to congestion on streets, a feeling we are living on top of each other, and a drain on services"

> "Access to more programs, activities and opportunities for all people" "Funding for more charity and community events"

"Plant more trees on streets and in parks. Encourage people to plant and maintain trees" "Stronger regulations on illegal dumping"

"To have a cleaner, healthier and green environment"

"Cheaper shop rental to promote the already bustling streets"

"Greater and enhanced open spaces for young families particularly those living in apartment buildings or granny flats"

"Youth workplace training programs to prepare youth for the workplace, as it can be difficult to find a iob with no work experience or training"

"More emphasis about education to make refugees feel welcome in the community" "More communication from council regarding local issues"

THE TOP PRIORITIES

Effective engagement allows detailed information gathering which captures community information and knowledge in order to understand the community's top priorities.

Listing these community priorities in order of importance as identified by the community assists stakeholders in focusing on what the community's needs are. Priorities may change in the community, or with changes in people's concerns or knowledge, which is why we engage the community every four years to ensure the

priorities are still reflecting the community's needs and aspirations.

Respondents were asked to identify what are the five priorities that would make Fairfield City an even better place to live and work in and they were requested to provide suggestions on how to achieve these priorities.

The 2,157 surveys collected provided a total of 8,593 responses to this question, in addition to 1,208 collected as part of the Service Levels and Indicator Survey, and are outlined in Figure 17 below, highlighting the most important priorities the community want achieved as part of the 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan:




Figure 18: Ratio of Top Ten Priorities to Overall Priorities

Survey participants were asked if they wanted the priority they had selected as one of their top ten priorities, to be 'maintained, more of it or improved in the future' and they were asked to suggest some ways of achieving their top ten priorities.

This information clearly identifies potential goals for stakeholders when developing their strategies, plans and policies into the future.

PRIORITY 1 – CONNECTED TRANSPORT SYSTEM, INCLUDING REGIONAL LINKS

This priority represents 7% of survey participants identifying concerns relating to delivering connected transport systems, including regional links. As represented by the chart below, the half (50%) of survey participants expect the delivery level of this priority to be increased.




Figure 19: Connected Transport System, including Regional Links

To better understand this priority, we asked the survey participants to 'suggest some ways to achieve the priority they have selected'; some of the comments provided by the survey participants are listed below:

- Increased frequency of public transport
- More bus routes to suburban areas
- New train lines
- More routes to the west of Fairfield City
- Reduce number of transport connections needed to get to major CBD's across Sydney
- New innovative transport systems better connect to Parramatta and new airport
- Community transport such as shuttle buses for the elderly to shopping centres
- Better Integrated timetables between buses and trains
- Improving length of time to connect to nearby Cities, such as more express trains
- Improve access between railway stations and major bus routes
- Better train service with less overcrowded trains
- Provide more and wider lift access to all train stations for people with a disability
- Improve bus shelters

PRIORITY 2 - COMMUNITY SAFETY

This priority represents 5.7% of survey participants identifying concerns relating to community safety. As represented by the chart below, the majority (60%) of survey participants expect the delivery level of this priority to be improved.




Figure 20: Community Safety




Figure 21: Car Parking Spaces

PRIORITY 4 – CLEANER STREETS AND PUBLIC AREAS

This priority represents 5.2% of survey participants identifying concerns relating to delivering cleaner streets and public areas. As represented by the chart below, the majority (58%) of survey participants expect the delivery level of this priority to be improved.




Figure 22: Cleaner Streets and Public Areas




Figure 23: Attractive and Lively Town Centres




Figure 24: Inviting and Well Used Community Places and Parks




Figure 25: Local Shopping Variety




Figure 26: Activities and Facilities for Children and Youth




Figure 27: More Job Opportunities




Figure 28: Local Traffic Flow and Road Safety

THEMES

In developing the 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan, Council ensured a balanced approach by utilising the Social Justice Principles and the Quadruple Bottom Line framework. The Social Justice Principles ensured social considerations such as equity, access, participation and rights were taken into account with the Quadruple Bottom Line ensured that the City Plan is developed holistically and is balanced, rather than favouring one particular aspect.

Based on the community's needs and aspirations identified during the implementation of the Fairfield City 2020 Community Engagement Strategy, the following five themes were identified towards achieving their vision, priorities and goals, which based on this engagement, has not fundamentally changed compared to the 2016-2026 Fairfield City Plan:



 Theme 4: It was identified that promoting a robust economy in Fairfield City would in turn generate diverse services and job opportunities.

Based on community feedback, the distribution of feedback on priorities and aspirations focused on Theme 2 (34%), Theme 1 (31%), Theme 3 (16%), Theme 4 (14%) and Theme 5 (5%).



Identifying goals is vital to formulating successful strategies and plans and identifying where the community wants to be. Goals generally give focus for stakeholders to work towards and are measurable when tracking progress.

To determine the goals required for the 2022-2032 Fairfield City Plan, the needs and aspirations identified from the outcomes of the community engagement activities have been grouped into the theme areas in more detail and are provided in the following pages.

THEME 1 – COMMUNITY WELLBEING

Community Wellbeing relates to the quality of life we enjoy when we live, work, play, shop and visit Fairfield City. It's about a good relationship with our neighbours, the opportunities we have to meet our daily needs and achieve our ambitions, our sense of belonging, respect for the things we value, the support that's available when we need it, and the pride we feel in our diverse community and neighbourhoods.

This theme represents 31% of survey participants needs and aspirations identified from community engagement activities.




Figure 30: % of Survey Participants needs represented by Theme 1

This theme represents 34% of survey participants needs and aspirations identified from community engagement activities.




Figure 33: % of Survey Participants needs represented by Theme 2

The following are direct comments that were made in relation to the community's needs and aspirations for Theme 2 – Place and Infrastructure:

"Development that is not a cost to the Fairfield environment, but rather improves it. Developers don't have the right to make it worse for us and then expect us to suffer the consequences. (increased flooding, hotter streets with less trees)"

"Better looking developments to improve the area"

"As the population in our area burgeons, we need to think about better medium density housing, built to a better standard, close to public transport, and of a better visual appeal."

"All unused buildings that are local to consider could this be actual affordable housing not just for people who are in housing but affordable rentable houses for private renters who have one income. There should be more community initiatives to help the homeless who usually hang around public pathways or the malls, instead they should have somewhere they can go, clean up, do something productive that supports the community as a whole. Going by the few rundown buildings especially near the train station the building is falling apart but it could be rentals for anyone it's just wasted space. housing affordability is a community issue."

"It would be nice if a survey could be conducted to see how much people pay rent in different accommodations and how much they think they should be paying. I think hearing community members discuss the cost of living will support the notion of having ' rent control'."

"Develop an affordable housing policy to ensure a minimum level of affordable housing is provided in developments"

"Answer the community needs not just generalised"

"see more neighbourhood network committees and community members involved in these neighbourhood from the refugee and CALD background"

"Plans developed with feedback from members of the community"

"Surveys and continual engagement with the community"

"Wider roads, traffic lights and roads built with safety and taking into consideration increasing population, more safe car parking"

"Plan roads and traffic to accommodate the growing Fairfield and the nearby suburbs. increase the number of traffic lights in the road and reduce the red and speed cameras."

"Clearer signage and road painted lines/arrows, etc., also trim trees on sidewalk when they grow too wide and obstruct the driver's view of the road"

"Better lighting, CCTV, panic poles as part of the smart poles"

"More lights, maybe CCTV"

"Extension of cycleway and traffic lights across busy roads"

"More brighter and updated street lights"

"Eastern Creek road and Horsley Drive are in need of urgent upgrade as they are getting clogged up from the amount of trucks coming in and out of Wetherill Park, Industrial area. Terminal for all truckies that are supporting their family but must park on the street should be built to prevent accidents as they are blocking view. Restwell road and the part where is parting towards Prairievale road should have one more line that would turn left."

"I would like Fairfield Council to build roads that are safe for cyclist such as bicycle lane, bike stands and reduced road speed. Increase transport links and connectivity to other CBD and more express services."

"Expanded roads and consider overpasses to create main arterial roads (e.g. Cumberland Highway) into mini highways"

"Decrease potholes and smooth roads, also cleaning up the gutters in public roads to make it more presentable."

"Repair major main roads frequently instead of resurfacing roads that are less used and in good condition"

"Wider and less potholes more kerbing and speed humps to be designed with no ditches"

"We need NBN into the house... we need reliable fast speed internet"

"No more dead spots, fast internet for all"

"Better 4G coverage in the area by speaking with Telstra regarding 4G towers"

"Active in protecting heritage buildings by finding ways of using old buildings for new ideas."

"Ensure heritage listed buildings are protected and celebrated as well as sites of local significance."

"Preserve our oldest buildings for future generations to admire"

"More walking tracks that are well lit, more accessible parks, and a lot of old parks need to be upgraded or moved to areas with high traffic flow for safety purposes. Some parks Prince street park is very old, and in an area that is very guiet and does not feel safe"

This theme represents 16% of survey participants needs and aspirations identified from community engagement activities.




Figure 36: % of Survey Participants needs represented by Theme 3

"Improved system of cleaning streets and public areas, and more responsibility given to residents and locals to not litter and to maintain a clean front yard."

"There should be more rubbish bins around and council to clean streets regularly as well as encourage the community to keep it clean"

"Trees to stabilise river and creek banks, finish the return to natural creek for the concrete creek through St John's Park and onwards"

"Creeks seem to getting "clogged" again. Just look at the creek that runs from North Liverpool Road to Cabramatta road for an example."

"Monitoring of creeks (e.g. streamflow quality), management of weeds and pollution (removal of rubbish in creeks)"

This theme represents 14% of survey participants needs and aspirations identified from community engagement activities.




Figure 39: % of Survey Participants needs represented by Theme 4

Decision making, especially in the public sector, must be transparent, objective and accountable. Good governance and leadership ensures the community has access to information and participates in the development of policies and decisions that affect them. Across all sectors of our community we look for a high standard of ethics, justice and honesty to be reflected in the actions and behaviour of individuals, organisations, businesses and governments.

This theme represents 5% of survey participants needs and aspirations identified from community engagement activities.




Figure 42: % of Survey Participants needs represented by Theme 5




Figure 57 Social Media Engagement - Twitter
